The Sensual Gardener

Wahoo! Spring is here & neighbourhood BBQs are wafting their scent everywhere! Food just tastes better outdoors. In fact, any food, even if prepared indoors, is more enjoyable when consumed sitting on your patio. How much more of an event it becomes enjoying your morning toast & jam out in the fresh air? I find a simple salmon-salad sandwich with a side of pickles packs far more punch if I just take a few more steps to enjoy it on my front porch instead of my kitchen table.

But COOKING out of doors - well THERE is a popular past time! It is not only fun, but the smell & anticipation heightens the pleasure of the meal itself. All your senses rise to the occasion. Beefy steaks siziling on a grill, wineners crisping over a campfire - verything past tastes BETTER doubton - it just DOES? Trich pizza or bread cooked in an outdoor over? - then you KNOW what I'M alking about. (Come to think of it - that probably explains the wide appeal of outdoor bistros & restaurant patios - why not have someone else do your cooking & you get to teaks & elioyi it outside?).)

When we eat outside we are exposed to a heady mix of scents accentuated & enriched by the fresh air & the warmth of the sun. Dining outside or 'Dining AI Fresco' - simple, plain everyday fare becomes a feast, whether an impromptu afternoon back yard picnic or an attractively laid out table 'set' for supper in the fading warmth of a setting sun.



Fresh produce, with it's amazing flavour, can be easily incorporated into a landscape, even in a small space. Last year my neighbour gave up trying to get her yearly vegetable plot planted & weeded. She opted instead for some hanging baskets of toma & zucchini vinces climbing a reflets by her sump back door. I do believe she is leaning toward more container gardening as she discovers how much less work it is than a full-fledged garden! If you don't have or want a spot dedicated to vegetables, why not try container growing?



Another little trick is to steal front row space from your sunny annual or perennial borders. A border of carrots provides a lacy, leafy look all summer & is easy to harvest in the fall. Or perhaps try strawberries. They make a wonderful edging plant & ar creatily 'at hand' when you walk that'i your yard. A row of peas or beaus can blend nicely with flowers as can a tomato or peper plant. You can always revert back to your favourie annuals & perennials next year. If you don't fancy growing your own, I needn't remind you fabulous fresh earling is always as close as our Famer's Market or your Grocersy Sinter Potokee Dept.!!

3 PLANTS to add to your TASTEFUL GARDEN:

CHIVES - yep, plain old chives offer a stunning 'spray of spiky green' when planted in the center of low growing annuals in a pot or hanging basket. Chop them off periodically to add to a fresh salad. They are one of the few things that will actually overwinter in a raised bed or plant pot!



CHERRIES - We CAN do this in Saskatchewan - Grow our own Cherries! Evans Cherry Trees (10' - 12' high) or Cherry Bushes (4' - 6' high) with names like Romeo or Juliet or Cupid abound at nurseries. You too can have 'B.C.' sized cherries picked from your garden! They are also known as Tart or Sour Cherries since they don't have the sweetness of a B.C. Bing Cherry. Even still, they are flavourful fresh eating!



HONEYBERRY - (aka Haskap) is a new shrub variety. My 3 year old bushes produced my first crop of these tasty, odd-shaped berries last Summer. They really DO taste like a cross between a Saskatoon & a Raspberry! What a treat! The shrubs are tried & true - tested for hardiness on the prairies, grow about 4' high & spread the same width. They love heat & hot, summer days but tolerate some shade too.



We can appreciate our sense of taste year 'round so delight in our Seasonal Opportunities to "Dine AI Fresco". SPRING- savour the crize cranch of a fresh, red Radish or the late Spring sweetness of Strawberries. SUMMER, our short but <u>cognitively</u> beautiful Summers afford the opportunity to grow Herds to *Ilavour or enhance* other foods. Or think of how much more could you possible enjoy the sunshine than lifting a *cold* glass of Orange Jucie to your orange jucie loving mouth?! AUTUMN - Harvest & Thanksgiving - an abundance of food spilling from the horn of plenty. One of my fall favourites - the *tar bits* of Crab Apples - need I say more? YUM! WINTER- recall the pure enjoyment of a *steaming* mug of Hot Chocolate after an enthusiastic workout of shoveling snow or watching an outdoor shinny match on a frosty day! (tho I must admit I am so very glad we don't have to think of THAT one for a long while!)

So what are you waiting for?! Hit the great outdoors already & tuck into cold, thick slices of watermelon or simply let the sweet juice of a peach dribble down your chin......hmmm I believe I'll go check the progress of my new Raspberries - I can taste them already!

BEARDED IRIS !



Irises remind me for all the world of flamboyant orchids. A relatively common perennial flower, it has many attributes that make it a great addition to any setting. While the bloom period is relatively short - they are such Showgirls! - more than worth their brief bloom span. Colours are endless & you can even get some interesting variegations on leaves!





Irises really shine, however, with the fact they have these marvellous, thick, sword-shaped leaves that appear out of the soil as a magnificent fan. The spiky look offers great leaves all Spring, Summer & Fall. What an awesome contrast to other plants! They adore hot sunny spots but will perform quite respectably in semi-shade.



Key to successful bloom is ensuring the roots (aka rhizomes) are only half buried in soil. They need their top section exposed in order to bloom properly so don't bury them deep or even just below the surface!
