

SHADE GARDENING




Makes one really think about the tree doesn't it Warren?

Some say you cannot have a lovely yard if there is too much shade - to this I say Phshaw! & again! PHSHAW!

Ideally a yard should have equal parts sunshine & shade but who among us live in THAT perfect world?

As much as we love our sun in SK - we would miss the shade if it wasn't there. Where would we head for respite in the midday heat? Where could we lounge outside with our favourite book? What better lowers our air conditioning costs? What's more - there'd be no place to grow those luscious Hostas &

- a couple of good examples from the NEST TOUR of shade, full sun & dappled shade!


Most shade that we encounter in our own yards is created by either trees or something manmade such as a building or screen. If you have shade already in your yard (as I do) then you have no choice but to work with it. If you have no shade or very little then you know what I am talking about - you probably would appreciate a shady spot or two!

Before we get into the type of gardening you can do in the shade - let's look at the varying types of it. (We will look at only decorative plants - not vegetables tho' there are a dizzying array of veggies you can grow in semi-shade!)

FULL SHADE means no sun whatsoever at all during daylight hours.



PARTIAL SHADE can mean many things - sun only in the morning or afternoon. It is usually created by a man-made feature such as the wall of a building or a fence. Sun for just



a few hours per day at any time &/or dappled shade - the kind you get sitting under a large tree.

Even **DAPPLED SHADE** has varying degrees - sometimes there can be a lot of sunlight or maybe just a glimmer here & there.

Then you might have dappled shade for just a portion of the day & full shade at other times thru' out daylight hours.

We also have to consider the difference between shade under an evergreen vs shade under a leafy tree. Evergreen shade is usually a lot more dense. Next we have to look at the south side of each tree as - again there is a different micro climate on the south side than there is on the north side.

Another point to consider is if you are growing anything under large trees - you have other concerns since the trees sop up any nutrients & water available at the expense of another plants. So you'll likely have to supply more water in that instance - particularly if we have dry weather.


Most shade loving plants - will do well with at least faint dappled shade or a few hours of sunlight. Very few things will prosper in total shade (with the exception of moss - which also has it's own charm I might add! hmmm-m-m - there's another topic for me to cover!)



To really succeed at shade gardening - you should always follow my mantra - *right plant in the right place*. Choose plants that do well in the shade or semi-shade. If you pick sun loving ones - you are pretty much setting yourself up for failure. The plants may grow but will not thrive & not even look half decent.

Remember too, that shade loving plants come from a forest floor where there is lots of rotted, organic matter (leaves, etc.), plenty of moisture & need I say it? Lotsa shade! SO *ammending your soil is critical*. Never assume that existing soil is good enough!

I could go on & on about shade gardening (as most of you already know!) You can create shady water features, rock gardens in the shade, potted shade loving annuals.......... But let's not get bogged down with details - get out there & create a work of art in your shady patches. It is well worth your while!

PLANT OF THE MOMENT

EUPHORBIA 'Diamond Frost' (aka as a Pot Stuffer!)

This delicate little Annual is well suited for shaded pots (or even sun loving ones!)

It can serve as an excellent substitute for baby's breath in any setting as it spills over container edges.

Frothy, poufy - just a fabulous cloud with tiny diamond-like white flowers backed by small emerald green leaves!



It's brightness sets it apart from other coloured annuals in the shade & in fact it enhances any foliage or flower hue - even white!

Planted in any in ground beds, it is a superb bare spot filler not only for it's good looks but also the fact it will not crowd out competing plants.

It is easily available at most local nurseries & can be added at any time during the growing season.

Definitely a winner in my world!
